Jubilee Pilgrimage and Celebrations Launch

After our celebration Mass last week to mark the start of the Jubilee Year, we have spent some time in our classes this week exploring what our pilgrimage route might look like. The children came up with some wonderful ideas for places/organisations, in our local community that are special to us or that support the life of our school, that could be places to be visited on our Pilgrimage. We will share more about this in the coming weeks, but we look forward to a very special day when this happens in May.



We will also be creating a school Jubilee footpath plotting the different ways that we can/will be Pilgrims of Hope during this special year.



To celebrate and commemorate the Jubilee Year 2025, Pilgrims of Hope, CAFOD commissioned an icon from artist Mulugeta Araya in Ethiopia, for the Catholic Church in England and Wales.

Ethiopia was chosen because of the strong tradition of iconography within the country and to demonstrate that this is a global Jubilee - not just something that is happening in England and Wales.

News from the classes

ReceptionReception has had a lovely week. We have been thinking about different foods and where
they come from. We did some fruit tasting and enjoyed some messy fruit and vegetable
printing. We enjoyed some bird watching on Wellie Wednesday as part of the RSPB Bird
Watch with our binoculars.



Year 1	Year 1 has had another busy week. In Maths, we finished our unit on 2D and 3D shapes.
	We went on a shape hunt around the classroom to see what objects we could find. In Art, we have been making collages and 3D shapes. In Geography, we have continued our work
	on 'United Kingdom': we had another look at a map of the UK, and we thought more about
	the capital cities of each country. In Science, we are looking at materials. We used objects
	around the classroom and described the material.
Year 2	Another busy and fun week in Year 2! We really enjoyed our session with Vicky from the Dogs' Trust and are going to follow Toby's Top Tips when interacting with our canine friends. In RE, we retold the story of the baptism of Jesus including an explanation of why it happened this way. We have continued our work as historians, looking at Scutari data (numbers of soldiers admitted and dying) and made connections between Florence Nightingale's work and the decrease in numbers. We also put our chronological skills to the test and ordered events in her life. In Art, we painted and our teacups for a Japanese tea ceremony and then decorated them with Japanese characters and cherry blossom. They look beautiful and Team 2.6 should be very proud. Well done for all you have achieved this week, Team 2.6! Keep up the great work!
Year 3	Year 3 has had a busy week. We really enjoyed a visit from the Dogs' Trust where we learnt about the protocol when approaching a dog and how to correctly handle them. We
	finished the session by writing a promise relating to being kind to dogs.
	In our English lessons this week, we learnt all about writing informal letters. The children
	then wrote a letter to Marvin the Magician explaining how Poppy's first day at her new boarding school had gone. We have now moved on to writing a synopsis of the story so far.
	In RE, we learnt all about parables and had a particular focus on 'The Parable of the
	Sower'. The children then created their own story boards to retell the parable.
	In PE we have been learning about handball and have even managed to have a few mini matches.
	Keep up the good work year 3!
Year 4	Year 4 has had a good week. We've carried on reading our class text, summarising what
	we've read so far and then making a prediction about what is going to happen next in the story. In maths we've come to the end of our multiplication topic and have started our new
	topic learning about length and perimeter. In Geography we've come to the end of our
	Mountains topic, we looked at the different mountains and mountain ranges in the UK as
	well as the tallest mountains in the world. In Science we've been learning about the
	different organs in the digestive system and their functions.

Year 5	Year 5 had a successful week and especially enjoyed their RSPB Birdwatch; we were able to spot many birds. Progress has been made in maths where we continued to improve our
	understanding of percentages. In Geography, we now fully understand the water cycle and
	have started to look at the major rivers of the world.
	Sports News: Well done to the boys' football team from 5&6 who beat St Mark's 6 –2.
	Sadly, cross country was postponed for Year 4 and 5.
Year 6	This week, Year 6 has continued learning about adaptation in Science. We read the story
Teal O	'Moth' by Isabel Thomas focusing on how living things, such as the peppered moth, have
	adapted to their environment over time. They had great fun camouflaging chameleons
	around the school, see if you can find any! Pupils had an extremely informative session
	from the 'Dogs' Trust': they learnt about signals that dogs display to their owners in order
	to improve the bond between them. Children have created amazing African scenes in art
	that include animals and traditional pattern.
