## **New Classrooms**

Four new classrooms has meant that Years 4-7 have now been split into two. Gone are the days of 120+ in a class now these classes averaged around 50-60. We discovered first hand that this is much more manageable when it comes to teaching! The pupils had far more space; with plenty of room between desks allowing pupils to move around and come to the board to take part in more interactive lessons.

#### **Reception Classes**

One of the most noticeable transformations was the Nursery and Reception classes. No more sitting on the concrete floor in all weathers or slatted walls where the rain could pour in! The classroom has been pulled down and the children moved to proper classrooms filled with bright furniture and colourful resources. The pupils have been divided into two smaller groups with the 2 1/2 - 4 year olds in one whilst the pupils aged 5/6 have their own space.

The difference this has made to the learning environment for the youngest children is marked.
